






Headteacher's Welcome continued...










World Class Behaviour

We understand that we all make mistakes, Jesus teaches us that it is normal for us to, but He also taught us how to get better, how to forgive and also how to say sorry.

If children fail to meet the high standards of behaviour, then sanctions may be used, typically:

- Loss of play time or lunchtime (LOFT time)
- Suspension from school for a fixed time

We encourage restorative practices as much as possible, we follow the lessons Jesus taught us, to repair relationships, and most importantly, to forgive.

It is important for us that parents work together with school in supporting our 'world class behaviours and basics'. Your support is needed and valued.

World Class Basics: Amazing Attendance

We believe that good and regular attendance is essential for children to reach their full potential. Good attendance and punctuality help children to achieve academically, gain self-confidence, develop a sense of belonging and maintain friendships.

We believe that setting good habits from the earliest point in education develops an understanding of responsibility and reliability that will help children throughout their time at school and into their adult lives. In order for this to happen, parents and the school need to work together to ensure that pupils attend regularly and on time.

Attendance is subject to education laws and parents have a legal responsibility to ensure their child receives their right to an education. Failure to do so may lead to prosecution.

Every opportunity will be used to convey to pupils and their parents/carers the importance of regular and punctual attendance.

Holidays in term time are not permitted and will not be authorised.

Curriculum Overview

Compassion

Through expressing love, kindness and empathy towards each other, our children will become curious, resilient learners who are self driven to achieve their best. Our curriculum enables our children to become comfortable within their own skin and love themselves for who they are; understanding that they are unique and made in the image of God.

Through **compassionate**, **inclusive teaching**, staff will **nurture** all learners to become **resilient** and show **empathy** towards each other.

Ambition

Our ambitious curriculum aspires the children to strive for excellence in all that they do. Our curriculum has been designed to provide a level of challenge to inspire curiosity for all learners. Our curriculum is carefully designed to develop and nurture our children's dreams and aspirations through the study of diverse, relevant and aspirational role models.

Rejoice

Celebration is pivotal to our curriculum and weekly awards and assemblies celebrate the achievement of our children.

Excellence

Our curriculum allows our children to **strive for excellence** and experience **new opportunities** for example, through extracurricular activities such as choir and gaming. Within all subjects taught, our enthusiastic teachers have **high expectations** for our children and our children set aspirational goals for themselves. Our curriculum develops independence and provides opportunities for our children to identify their own, and their friends, next steps.

Service

When our children leave St Stephen's, they will understand that they have a special place within our world and understand their responsibility to help 'make the world a better place as God intended'. Our children will have developed transferable skills that will prepare them for high school and beyond. Through studies of careers and aspirational role models, our children will be aware that they have gifts to be shared with the world.











Curriculum Overview

Curriculum Organisation

Religious Education is at the heart of our curriculum and makes up 10% of each class timetable. Mathematics, English, Guided Reading and Phonics are taught daily. Our foundation subjects are taught discreetly however, there are explicit cross curricular links amongst them. Spiritual, moral, social and cultural development (SMSC) is embedded throughout lessons and everyday aspects of school life. We are lucky to have a dedicated PE teacher in school who teaches all classes in all phases. All our subjects have their own intent statement mirroring our curriculum aims.

Over the course of children's time here at St Stephen's they will study a variety of subjects:

- Religious Education, including Relationship, Sex and Health Education
- English
- **Mathematics**
- Science
- History
- Geography
- Computing
- Music
- **Physical Education**
- A Modern Foreign Language Spanish
- **PSHE**
- Art
- Design Technology











Religious Education Overview, including RSHE Education

At St Stephen's, Religious Education is central to our curriculum. As a Catholic School, Gospel Values are rooted throughout all that we do and Catholic Social teaching is at the heart of each topic we teach. We are committed to putting our faith into action and work closely with charities such as Caritas and CAFOD throughout the year.

We believe that it is a great privilege and honour to guide children on their own faith journey. Central to each classroom in school, is an prayer table which reflects the Liturgical Year. Liturgical celebrations are paramount within our calendar and our pupil chaplaincy team regularly lead whole school liturgies where we celebrate and reflect together as a community.

We have strong links with the Parish and Parish Priest, Father B. Wilson. Each week, we celebrate Mass with the parish, which are a highlight of the week. When in Year 3, the children will be invited to participate in the Sacramental Programme and receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion.

Religious Education Overview, including RSHE Education

Religious Education formulates 10% of curriculum time in each class. As a school, we follow the 'Come and See' scheme of work. During each year, the children will develop and build upon their knowledge of:

- Church (Domestic and local church)
- The Sacraments
- **Liturgical Celebrations**

At St Stephen's, we use a creative approach to teaching Religious Education. Lessons involve: analyse of scripture, writing in role, drama, art, music and meditation.

RSHE (Relationships, Sex and Health Education) is taught in all year groups in an age appropriate manner. At St Stephen's we follow 'Life to the Full', a Catholic based RSHE scheme of work. At the heart of our RSHE curriculum is the understanding that we are made in the image and likeness of God.

Parental involvement with our RSHE scheme is actively encouraged and annual parental consultation sessions are held in school.















Early Years Foundation Stage - Nursery and Reception

Early Years Foundation Stage Nursery and Reception

The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) is the stage of education for children from birth to the end of the Reception year. It is based on the recognition that children learn best through play and active learning.

There are seven areas of learning, including three prime areas:

- Communication and Language
- Physical Development
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development

And four specific areas of learning:

- Literacy
- **Mathematics**
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

There are also three characteristics of effective learning based on how young children learn. These must be taken into account when we plan and guide children's activities.

- Playing and exploring
- Active learning
- Creating and thinking critically

















Key Stage One - Year 1 and 2

Key Stage One - Years 1 and 2

In Key Stage One we believe that education is about the development of the whole child. We know that KS1 is a crucial stage in your child's learning journey. It is a time when good learning habits are established, a love of learning is developed and children begin to recognise their own strengths and areas of development.



We aim to provide a learning environments where children learn through first hand experiences and start to take responsibility for their own learning. In Year 1 we aim for a smooth transition from Early Years by providing learning opportunities and challenges through a mixture of class lessons and continuous provision. We offer a broad and enriched curriculum where there is a strong focus on teaching in ways that promote and account for the stage of development of the child.



Year Two is the final year of Key Stage One. Work previously covered in Year One is extended and consolidated and the children become able to work independently for sustained periods of time.











Key Stage Two - Year 3, 4, 5 and 6

Key Stage Two - Years 3, 4, 5 and 6

In Key Stage 2 (Years 3 to 6), we provide a stimulating and engaging environment that fosters a love for learning.

Our dedicated teachers inspire students to reach their full potential, guiding them through key academic milestones such as the Year 4 multiplication check and Year 6 SATs.

However, our focus extends beyond examinations; we prioritise instilling core values in our students. Compassion, ambition, rejoice, excellence, and service form the foundation of our school community, encouraging kindness, determination, celebration of achievements, pursuit of excellence, and helping others. I

In addition, our learning powers of resilience, empathy, high aspirations, curiosity, and innovation empower our students to become confident and independent learners. We believe in fostering positivity and creating a supportive atmosphere where each child can flourish and develop lifelong skills.









Personal Development

One of the foundation stones for St Stephen's reputation and ethos is its strong pastoral support. It has developed over many years to become the strong, motivated and successful team responsible for the welfare of pupils at St Stephen's.

Each year group also has a dedicated Senior Leader who parents and children can contact if they have any queries, concerns or require support in a particular area. In the first instance, class teachers should be in the first point of contact for parents who wish to discuss a particular issue regarding their child. Should you require further discussions, please contact the Senior Leader responsible for your child's year group.

Each year group is linked to a Senior Leader who is responsible for the progress, attainment and personal development of the pupils in their year groups. The role of pastoral staff is to ensure the fundamentals are in place so that pupils can achieve their best possible outcomes.

The Senior Leader responsible for Behaviour and Attitudes (Miss Dempsey) has oversight of, and overall responsibility for, safeguarding and pastoral support at St Stephen's RC Primary School.






Reading for pleasure

Reading at St Stephen's

Reading plays a vital role in a child's educational journey, particularly during their time at Primary School. At St Stephen's, we prioritise the development of strong reading skills in our young learners, starting with our phonics scheme called Little Wandle, which is taught in Nursery, Reception, Year 1, and Year 2. This scheme equips children with essential phonics knowledge and decoding strategies, paving the way for fluent reading.

Once the phonics scheme is completed, children transition to our reading program called Accelerated Reader, which accompanies them until they leave in Year 6.

Alongside these structured programs, our English Curriculum and Whole Class Reading Sessions expose children to a wide range of texts that celebrate diversity and teach them about difference, nurturing empathy and understanding.















Reading at St Stephen's

To help your child excel at reading, we have compiled five top tips for parents:

- Establish a reading routine: Encourage your child to read for a set amount of time each day. Whether it's before bedtime or after school, consistent reading habits promote a love for books and enhance reading skills.
- Create a reading-friendly environment: Designate a quiet and comfortable space where your child can read without distractions. Provide a variety of age-appropriate books and encourage them to explore different genres and authors.
- Be a reading role model: Children often imitate the behaviors they see around them. Demonstrate your own love for reading by sharing your favorite books, discussing what you're reading, and spending time reading together as a family.
- Engage in meaningful conversations: After your child finishes reading a book, engage them in conversations about the story, characters, and themes. Encourage them to express their thoughts, ask questions, and make connections to their own experiences.
- Visit libraries and bookshops: Take regular trips to libraries and bookshops, allowing your child to select books that interest them. Exposing them to a variety of reading materials broadens their horizons and nurtures a lifelong love for reading.

By following these tips and actively participating in your child's reading journey, you can provide them with the necessary support and encouragement to excel in their literacy skills at St Stephen's.















Sports Curriculum at St Stephen's

Supporting children with SEND

St Stephen's RC Primary operates a whole school inclusive approach for pupils with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities. All staff at our school are responsible for meeting the needs of all learners. In order to support this we provide constant training and professional development relating to SEND, Quality First, Adaptive and Inclusive teaching. Information is provided to all staff, on individual needs and strategies to support SEND pupils.

The Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Coordinator (Miss Lisa Dempsey) works with a team of teachers and learning support assistants to provide both in-class support and specialist support. There is close liaison between subject teachers and the SEND team to support learning, as well as pupils' behavioural, emotional or social difficulties.

The partnership between pupils, staff and parents is vital in order to help each individual gain maximum benefit from the curriculum and we welcome visits from prospective parents. We have the highest expectations for all our pupils but we recognise that some may need specialised support, which we look to provide.

In September 2022 we opened 'The Oasis' and 'The Nest' which is a new provision to support our learners with more tailored interventions and support around both academic and well-being issues.

We offer a safe space that pupils can access to enable them to accelerate their progress in all areas of their school life.

Leaders are adept at identifying the additional needs of pupils with SEND, including for children in early years. Teachers provide effective support for these pupils in class. This helps pupils with SEND, and their classmates, to learn without interruption' Ofsted, April 2022















Supporting children with SEND

Taking Account of Individual Pupils' Needs

At St Stephen's we are keen to ensure that we do not discriminate in line with the Equality Act 2010 and SEN Code of Practice 2015 - through application of the behaviour policy - against pupils whose apparent inappropriate behaviour may be a function of their SEND.

There will be circumstances in which some pupils may need reasonable adjustments to access areas of their school life and staff take account of those individual pupil needs when supporting pupils. Staff appreciate that there are many influences and stresses that can affect a pupils' behaviour, and all pupils are treated with our Gospel values.

External Partners

St Stephen's RC Primary liaises with other professional partnerships who visit regularly. These include contact with NHS specialists, Mental Health Specialists, Educational Psychologist and other services. These partners may be involved in working with your child, reporting to you and contributing to the overall plan for what your child needs.

Support for Families

We aim to foster a community spirit at St Stephen's and in order to achieve this we shall be organising regular coffee mornings, parenting workshops and support sessions for identified groups.

Pupils also take an active role in supporting others. They raise money for charity and are keen eco-champions.'













Structure of the School Day

The makeup of the day can vary depending on what year group your child is in, for example, playtimes and lunchtimes are staggered throughout the morning.

Start of the school day:

Doors open to all classrooms at 8:40am and close at 8:55am. Children complete a variety of morning tasks during this time. Registration begins at 8:50am till 8:55am, after this time, your child will be given a late mark.

Prayer and liturgy begins at 8:55am daily for each class. Entrance gates close at 8:55am. If you arrive after this time, please enter via the main school office and sign your child in on the screen.

School finishes at 3:15pm. You will not be able to access the school site until the gates to the school open at 3:10pm for safeguarding reasons.

If your child needs to attend an appointment that cannot be made outside of the school day, we ask that you collect your child from the school office and sign them out on the screen. We do ask for appointment cards to be shown for our records.

Uniform Guidance

- Our school colour is **blue** with grey, white and red.
- Sweatshirts and cardigans should be blue.
- Polo shirts/shirts, tee shirts (for PE), should be white.
- Skirts, pinafore dresses, trousers and shorts should be **grey**.
- During the summer term, **blue and white** summer dresses can be worn.
- Black school shoes should be worn 'fashion' footwear such as black trainers or heavy boots should not be worn even if they are in school colours.































Plain, black shoes must be worn as part of St Stephen's uniform.

Black training shoes should **not** be worn as alternatives to shoes, e.g. Converse, Nike, Adidas, etc.









Uniform Guidance for PE

PE Kit includes:

- A royal blue school hoodie (school logo branded available to purchase)
- A royal blue school polo shirt (school logo branded available to purchase)
- A pair of navy school tracksuit bottoms (school logo branded available to purchase)
- A pair of navy school shorts (school logo branded available to purchase)

We to allow all year groups to come into school wearing their PE kit on their 'Active Days'. Nearer to the start of the academic year, you will be provided with a timetable, it will state clearly which day your child can come in in their PE kit - these days will be called 'Active Day Wear' and the others 'Uniform Day Wear'.




















Uniform Guidance for PE

There are two ways to order this fantastic kit:

- Order the whole bundle directly through school (we cannot order individual items). You will need a document called 'PE Kit Order'. Simply fill the form in and email it back to admin@stsrcp.co.uk with your details and sizes. Then, on Parent Pay, you will see an item listed 'PE Kit Bundle'. Pay your £28.00 and school will distribute the kit when it is delivered.
- Alternatively, order directly from https://topmarksschoolwear.co.uk/ prices are a little more expensive, however you can order individual items. (if you are unsure of sizes, you can always visit Top Marks School Wear in Ashton)
- School branded kits are optional, you can purchase them unbranded from elsewhere





















Uniform Guidance

Jewellery:

Earrings **can** be worn at St Stephen's but they **must** be a single pair of plain studs. Other jewellery such as necklaces, bracelets, bands, facial piercings should **not** be worn.

All jewellery, including watches, should not be worn for PE lessons for health and safety reasons.

Wristwatches **can** be worn. For safeguarding reasons, 'smartwatches' that have access to the internet, can take photos and videos and/or can receive phone calls or messages **cannot** be worn as a wristwatch.

Hair:

No fashion statement or extreme haircuts.
