



Enjoy hearing your child's thoughts about this Sunday's Gospel and this Wednesday's word, which is HAPPINESS.



Nursery

What a busy week in Nursery we have had!

In Phonics we have loved learning the rhyme 'The Wheels on the bus' we especially liked the actions for this rhyme.

In Maths, we have made comparisons between objects relating to size and compared sizes using big/little/small.

During outdoor provision, we have loved the balance bikes especially making a ramp using crates and planks of wood to carefully balance the bike from one side to the other. The children showed lots of skills doing this.

On Thursday we took part in 'Hello Yellow Day' we sang songs, danced and took part in a Zumba session with our friends in Reception.

Reception

What a fantastic week we have had in Reception! In maths, we have been learning about measure and patterns. The children have been comparing capacity in the water area and have been exploring repeating patterns.

In Literacy, we have continued our class book "The Leaf Thief?" We have been using Talk for Writing to retell the story using actions.

In phonics, we have learnt the phonemes 'h' 'b' 'f' and 'l'. We have also learnt how to form these letters.

As we came to the end of the week, Reception really enjoyed Hello Yellow Day. We wore yellow, spoke how important it is to talk about our feelings and our worries and enjoyed some fun zumba outside.

Well done Reception!

Year 1

This week the children have shown greater independence in their rainbow challenges across the curriculum- well done Year 1! In English the children have been working hard to develop their story language using our text "Pussy Cat, Pussy Cat where have you been?" - we can see the impact of their phonics is having on their sentence work. In maths we are coming to the end of our work on place value and have been comparing and ordering numbers to 10. We have also been putting numbers on a number line. We began using our knowledge to add and subtract within 10.In science we learnt about our sense of taste - we explored savoury, sweet, sour, salty and bitter foods. The children enjoyed carrying out an experiment to group foods. We have started a new RE topic on Judaism and looking at the stories of Abraham & Sarah and Moses. In history we compared the Lives of Queen Victoria and Queen Elizabeth I.On Thursday we took part in Hello Yellow Day and spent time completing fun activities that helped us learn about how important our mental health is.

Question- Can you name all five senses and the body parts we use with each sense?

Year 2

We had a lovely start to the week in Year 2 with a fun forest school session linked to our book 'The Highway Rat'. The children enjoyed acting as the characters and thinking about why it is important to share. In English, we have been learning how to use expanded noun phrases, and used these to create an exciting wanted poster for the rat. In Maths, the children showed great determination in finding fact families to 20 and number bonds to 100. In RE, we have been learning and exploring Judaism. The children have been very respectful and wrote lovely senses poems about what they might experience at a Shabbat celebration. The children have been engaging well with a text in Guided Reading called 'Eight candles burning', also linked to this topic. Towards the end of the week, the children learnt about World Mental Health day. It was lovely to see them all dressed in yellow! We finished the week with a lovely friendship Mass where the children were very sensible and sang beautifully.

Year 3

Another very busy week in Year 3. On Thursday afternoon, Year 3 enjoyed a Forest Schools session. The weather was perfect for it. The children had to make their own Stone Age dens and search the forest for both useful and ornamental things to put in it. Mrs Artingstall made a fire whilst the children discussed the importance of living as part of a tribe.

In Maths, we have begun our new unit on Addition and Subtraction by adding ones and tens as well as applying number bonds within ten. We have begun to work hard on our times tables starting with 2's.

In English we read most of 'Stone Age Boy.' We did two pieces of work on verbs and looked at the characters in the story, finding evidence for our opinions of them.

This week was Judaism week. Year 3 looked at the synagogue as a place of worship. We looked carefully at the items and holy objects found in a synagogue. We compared what we learnt about the synagogue to our own church.

In Science, we looked at animals with and without spines and those animals which have exoskeletons.

Question: How do you say 'red' in Spanish?

Year 4

We have had a lovely week in Year Four. We have continued our singing lessons and the children are really growing in confidence. They are learning how to project their voice and enunciate when they sing. This week, our singing teacher, Miss Bradley taught us all about how a piano works. She showed the children the different notes that the keys make and the children had the opportunity to look inside the piano to see the strings and the hammers.

In history, we learnt about slavery. We discussed the role that slavery played in Ancient Egyptian civilization and who slaves were.

In English, we started our new book 'The Lost Happy Endings'. The children enjoyed thinking of traditional tales and turning their happy endings into bad ones. They were really creative with their ideas and this activity allowed them to become immersed in the story.

On Thursday, we celebrated World Mental Health Day with Hello Yellow. We had some interesting discussions about how we can look after our mental health and then created a pocket-guide of tips and strategies that would work for us.

Question: What is one thing you can do to look after your mental health?

Year 5

Another fabulous week of celebrations in Year 5! On Thursday, 5LS held a fantastic class assembly, which celebrated the many talents of the children. It was wonderful to see the children showcase their God given talents and there wasn't a dry eye when they signed to the song True Colours by the Kaos Signing Choir.

In English, we planned and wrote narratives for Saving the Butterfly from the viewpoint of the blanket and rabbit. The children have worked hard to include descriptive and emotive language, direct speech and a range of sentence types.

This week, in Maths, we concluded our unit on place value and began our work on mental and written methods of addition and subtraction. This will be a focus in maths for the rest of the half term.

In Science, we have been planning our air resistance investigations. The children considered a number of factors they could change, identified what they would measure/ observe, considered the factors needed to make it a fair text and made predictions about the outcome. We will be conducting the experiment next week.

Finally, just a reminder that the Stay and Pray for 5LW will take place in class at 9am on Monday 14.10.24 and 5LS will hold theirs at 9am on Tuesday 15.10.24.

Year 6

It has been a busy week here in Year 6 and the children have been working extremely hard.

In English, we have continued our learning based on 'The Final Year' and first began by unpicking the character traits of those in the book and used evidence from the text to inform impression and evidence questions. Following this, we learnt to identify relative clauses and relative pronouns before utilising these in an informal letter to Mr Joshua. In preparation for next week, the children have planned a diary entry for Nate's experience on the school residential which they will begin to write on Monday.

Well done Year 6!

Utilising the formal written method for multiplication has been our focus in Maths this week. We have worked systematically to multiply 4-digit numbers by 2-digit numbers. The children have consolidated their knowledge and understanding, refined their skills and have applied these to a range of problem solving questions.

In RE, the children have been learning about the Parables of 'The Vineyard Workers' and 'The Prodigal Son'. The children worked hard to analyse the message of these and their purpose, considering why they were shared at the time. Following this, we focused on 'The Prodigal Son', taking on the role of the younger son to write a letter

of apology to his father, asking for forgiveness. **Question: What is 4572 x 56?**
