

1 Enjoy reading this Sunday's Gospel


James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus and said, "Master, we want you to do us a favour." Jesus said, "What is it you want me to do

GREATNESS (

"Doing little things with a strong desire to please God makes them great." St Francis de Sales

What did Jesus say he had come to do? It's natural to want to be great. In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus teaches the disciples how to be truly great. Being kind, self-giving, thoughtful and helpful are great qualities. It's not always easy to live our lives in this way but it is the way that God want us to live, to become the best that we can be. Ask your child what the word 'greatness' means to them. Who does your child know at home, at school or in the community who shows true greatness by putting others' needs first? It may help your child if you tell them about someone you know to be 'great'.

God is great and He made us to be great too. Through spending lots of his time serving others Jesus shows us the way to true greatness. Each of you share one thing about other family members which you think makes them great. Then choose a way in which you can be 'great' for each other this week. Perhaps you can: look for new ways to serve someone at home or at school; offer help at mealtimes, preparing the food and clearing up afterwards; avoid being bossy; resist pushing in and let others go first instead; give your time or money where needed.

Reception

What an amazing MONSTER week we've had in Reception!

On Monday, we had a visitor... A MONSTER!!! The monster left us picture clues in our classroom to help us work out who had made the mess. We drew a map of our classroom and placed the clues in the areas we found them in. Our geographical knowledge was great! The monster left us a story to read and a note to explain why he visited.

The children have all made a monster sock puppet as a friend for the main character in our story "Something Else". Thank you for all of the sock donations! We have made monster collages, created and named our own monsters, fed the monsters some monster sounds and even designed and built homes for our monsters to live in!

Towards the end of the week, we had an AMAZING monster ball. We ate monster food, played monster games and of course did some monster dancing!

On Friday, we attended whole school mass alongside our Year 6 special friends.

Year 1

We have had a great final week of term in year 1! We really enjoyed speaking to you at parent's evening and sharing your child's progress. In maths, we have been writing addition number sentences and finding systematic number bonds within 10. In science the children were assessed on their understanding of the 5 senses. In history this week, we learned about our current prime minister and discussed what rules we would enforce if we were in charge. In R.E we looked at the significance of Baptism and some of the symbols and their meanings. We completed our art unit on spirals and look forward to sharing our work with you next half term. To finish the week, we had our Fire Safety afternoon. Children learned about how to avoid fire hazards and how to stay safe in the event of a fire.

Year 2

What a lovely end to the half term we have had. The children have worked so hard, well done. We enjoyed speaking to you all at Parents evening, we hope you found the meetings informative and we are sure you are proud of all the hard work the children have been doing.

This week in English, we have been writing letters of apology from the Highway Rat to the animals. In Maths, we have been completing some challenging work with addition and subtraction of numbers across ten. In RE, we have thought about the meaning of signs and symbols at a Baptism, and what special people might say at the celebration. The children have been completing some computing work this week exploring IT around us and some Science about healthy diets, personal and oral hygiene. We concluded the week with a beautiful whole school mass, and enjoyed learning some important information during our fire safety day. Have a great half term.

Year 3

This week has been incredibly busy as we finish for the half term holiday. In Religion, we have begun to look at Baptism and the promises made by parents and godparents to guide us in following Jesus. The children talked about their own godparents and how loved they are by the adults in their lives.

In English, we completed our unit on Stone Age Boy by writing a non-chronological report about the Stone Age. The children had lots of learning to draw on through English, History and Guided Reading texts.

In Maths, the children have been working on relating addition and subtraction facts. We also started to work on our 3 times table by learning it together and

This month is Black History month. Year 3 had to look at the places which produced cotton for the Manchester cotton traders. We also looked a little at the conditions slaves worked and lived in. The children listened to and sang the song 'Swing Low Sweet Chariot' then we discussed its meaning. Everyone then created their own picture depicting one or more aspects of what they had learnt about.

Year 4

In the final week of this term, the children have been incredibly busy completing their work and are definitely ready for some rest and relaxation.

In English, we finished our work on 'The Lost Happy Endings' by writing a set of instructions which explained how to deliver the happy endings. The children had lots of really creative ideas and thought carefully about how they could engage their reader. It has been lovely to see the progress made by everyone this term and this piece of work has really showcased that!

In History, we researched the lives of Tutankhamnun and Cleopatra to find out what made them such significant figures with ancient Egypt. Then, the children put all of this information into a double page spread. They really enjoyed completing this piece of work and found the whole topic extremely interesting.

In RE. we completed our Judaism unit. The children were great at making connections between the beliefs of Christianity and Judaism and building on their knowledge from previous years. We learnt about the torah and how important this holy book is within the Jewish faith. Then, we used ink and quills to have a go at writing some Hebrew words. The children loved this activity and created some beautiful work.

As part of Black History Month, we spent Friday learning about the life of Henry 'Box' Brown. Then, taking inspiration from our work on Shaun Tan in art, we created a piece of art depicting Brown's story,

Year 5

This week in Year 5, we have been completing our History, Science and RE units.

In History. we explored Maya writing, including glyphs, logograms and syllabograms. Following this, we created logograms of our own to represent our names and interests. In our next lesson, we looked at the Maya Number System, which uses a Base 20 system. The children wrote numbers up to 8,000 and created calculations using a range of operations. Finally, we explored the game of Pok-ta-pok, which resembles an early type of football. However, participants are only allowed to use their knees, elbows and hips. The children were also surprised to learn that the leader of the losing team lost his head. Yikes!

In Science, we completed our parachute investigation, wrote our conclusions, discussed limitations to our investigation and identified anomalous results. We then investigated water resistance and the effects of different shapes on water resistance. Finally, we looked at gears and levers and how, with a lever, a smaller input force can have a greater impact on the output force.

To conclude our RE unit on Ourselves, we wrote prayers linked to the poem 'Footprints' and completed our 'Check Out' task, as well as completing work around Judaism.

Year 6

Another busy week here in Year 6! It was lovely to meet so many of you at Parent's Evening last night to celebrate your child's achievements and areas for development. This week, in Maths, the children have shown great resilience when learning about long division. The children have utilised their understanding of multiples and have used the formal written methods to successfully divide three and four digit numbers by a two digit number. Well done Year 6!

In English, we have concluded our unit on 'The Final Year' by conducting a character analysis on PS and compared how his personality and actions changed at different stages of the story. Following this, we planed and wrote detailed apology letters to Nate from the perspective of PS, incorporating a range of multi-clause sentences, fronted adverbials and parenthesis.

In History, we have been learning about the Manchester Blitz and the children have conducted in depth research around the topic and have presented their findings in beautiful double page spreads. The teachers have been really impressed with the results and the children should be very proud of themselves.

Question: Why was Manchester targeted during the Blitz?
