





Nursery

We started the week learning all about Remembrance Day.

We had a little walk to the front of school to lay our Poppy wreath that we had made as a class. We then came back to class and observed a 2 minute silence- thinking about the soldiers in the war.

We were excited to showcase our 'Firework' Art this week in the school hall and enjoyed looking at the work our friends from across the school had also produced.

In this weeks Celebration of the Word, we listened to an alleluia as we placed a candle and bible in the centre of our circle, we then passed the Bible around the circle. We know that the Bible is special and that Jesus is the Light of our World.

We have enjoyed singing 'One, Two buckle my shoe' in phonics this week as well as learning the 's' sound. We can identify some objects/pictures that begin with the 's' sound.

We have continued to focus on the book 'Wow! Said the Owl.'

We have enjoyed re-telling the story using a story map and mark making our own Owls in the writing area.

Question- Can you retell the story of Wow! Said the Owl'?

Reception

Another very busy week in Reception! We have started our new topic where we are answering the question "Where is the Magic?" We are reading the story "Room on the Broom" and have immersed ourselves in the text. We have summarised the story, sequenced the story and we have used emojis to think about how characters feel at different parts of the story. We have been trying hard to use the puppets and act out the story using key vocabulary in the reading area and writing story words such as dog, cat and hat in the phonics area

In maths we have been thinking about the numbers 4 and 5 and are practising out subitising skills. We have also thought about positional language and the special words we use to describe where something is.

We had a lovely trip to church on Tuesday where we learnt all about Baptism and being welcomed into God's family.

The week's just seem to flying by, we can't believe it will be week 3 of the second half term next week! Thank you to all adults who attended the first VIP sessions this week. We are excited to welcome more families in the coming weeks.

Year 1

The children have had a busy week. We were surprised to find some vegetables trapped in our garden. The children were keen to create wanted posters to capture the Evil Pea. In English, we used 'Talk for Writing' to create a story map of 'Supertato'. In maths, we have been working on number bonds within 10 and using them to solve addition word problems. In R.E, the children shared their understanding of the symbols used in baptism. They enjoyed acting out a baptism in class. In science, we began our unit on materials. The children identified what objects were made from rock. WE enjoyed Odds Socks day and celebrating our individuality. As part of our Anti Bullying week work we discussed what respect means and how we can show it. We finished the week by designing and making superhero capes.

Year 2

Another fantastic week in Year 2 - the children are working so hard. In Maths this week, the children have been beginning to exchange tens and ones to support them in addition and subtraction of two digit numbers. In English, we have been focusing on the use of imperative verbs and how to use these to write instructions. The children even made their own disgusting sandwich in the forest and wrote a set of instructions on how they made them! They had lots of fun! In RE we have thought about how we can follow in the light of Jesus. In Geography, we have started our Continents and Oceans unit and have started to explore what a continent is. We have been thinking about respect throughout our anti-bullying week and thought about how we can show it to others. We ended the week in our Celebration of the Word, where we spoke about All Souls month and the children decorated beautiful candles for special people in heaven.

Year 3

Lots has been happening in Year 3 this week.

On Tuesday we were excited about displaying our artwork in the hall and to see what work other classes have done.

On Wednesday and Thursday, we completed our Design and Technology unit on Iron Age Bread. First we learnt a bit about how modern bread is made and sampled some different varieties. Then we got into small groups and made Iron Age bread. We were excited to taste it.

In RE, we learnt about St Stephen who was the first martyr. We learnt about his life and faith then designed an icon for him.

In English we read the remainder of the story 'Into the Forest' and used emojis to consider the main character's different feelings throughout the story. We also looked at using apostrophes for both singular and plural possession.

In Maths we have practised addition problems where we have to exchange both ones and tens.

This week has been anti-bullying week. The children explored what it means to respect others regardless of our differences.

Question: What does St Stephen teach us?

Year 4

It has been a lovely week in Year Four with lots of opportunities for children to enjoy creating and admiring art. In preparation for the showcase, we spent Monday morning putting together our final piece. The children were able to demonstrate all of the new techniques that they had learnt this unit. The work produced by all was a real testament to their hard work and progress of skill.

As Christmas approaches, the children designed Christmas Cards for Angela Rayner's annual competition. This year's theme was 'Santa's super sleigh' and everyone enjoyed coming up with exciting adaptations that they could make to Santa's sleigh. We also looked at iconic monuments in Droylsden from both the past and present and incorporated those into our overall design.

In school this week, we celebrated Anti-Bullying week. As part of our Stay and Pray sessions, we thought about what the Bible teaches us about kindness and helping others. Then we created a piece of art as a year group which centered all around what it means to be kind.

Question: Give one positive and one negative about slavery in Ancient Egypt.

Year 5

We are extremely proud of the children this week. We started the week with a visit to the cenotaph to pay our respects to those who have fought and lost their lives in conflict. At the memorial, we placed poppy wreaths made by each of the classes, recited the poem 'In Flanders Fields' by John McCrae, said a prayer for those affected by war and held two minutes silence. The children were incredibly thoughtful and respectful and could not have represented the school any better.

In Art, we completed our unit of work, producing maps of our own and creating typography to suit the landmarks and features, as well as incorporating the shading and 3D drawing skills we have developed in previous sessions.

We began the novel Room 13 this week in English by making inferences about the book based on a range of book covers, before reading Chapter 1 and answering comprehension questions. Next week, we will investigate monologues and how they can be used to express a character's inner thoughts and feelings before writing our own.

Finally in Maths, we have considered the importance of using the inverse operation to check calculations. Following this, we solved two step addition and subtraction problems. Next week, we will complete our Addition and Subtraction work and begin our unit on Multiplication and Division by revising factors and multiples, including HCF and LCM.

Year 6

Another busy week here in Year 6! In English, we have continued our learning on Letters from the lighthouse. Initially, we introduced the children to semi-colons, teaching them to identify, use and apply these in their writing. To put this into practice, the children wrote a missing persons report for Sukie - ensuring to include parenthesis and descriptive vocabulary. Following this, we immersed ourselves into the text, using emojis and justifications to plan a letter home to mum from the perspective of Olive. The children have really enjoyed this story so far and have written some excellent letters and edited these ready for publishing next week.

In Maths, we have been revisiting our understanding of fractions. We have been finding equivalents as well as common numerators and denominators as we began to compare and order fractions. Next week, we will begin to add and subtract fractions before moving on to mixed numbers.

We paid our respects to those who fought and and lost their lives in conflict by being respectful and completing our two minute silence. The children were very mature and respectful throughout and we were very proud of them. To further understand what life was like in WWI, in History we have been learning about the roles of women and children and their impact in the war effort. We wrote letters to outline changes to our daily life and working in munitions factories. We also began to understand the roles of children and analysed propaganda posters before creating posters of our own to encourage children to 'do their bit'.

Question: Can you list three jobs which women may have undertaken to support the war effort?
