



Nursery

It's been a fab week in Nursery and all our children have worked so hard. We have enjoyed the nursery rhyme 'Hey, Diddle, Diddle!' in phonics and loved our new phonics game- What's in the box?- we have been focusing on the 'a' sound and we know some words which begin with this sound.

In Maths we have focused on the number two. We are able to show different ways of making number two and recognise the number two in our environment.

We have been very creative this week and created some lovely Owl art work for our class display, we spoke about the different features of Owls and know that they have big eyes and have lovely brown coloured feathers.

We enjoyed a lovely afternoon in the school forest with Mrs Artingstall on Tuesday, we had an Owl hunt, made Owl sounds, had a yummy hot chocolate and listened to 'Owl Babies' read by Miss Taylor.

We have wrapped up warm this week and loved exploring the ice outdoors.

Next week we have an exciting week planned- we will continue to focus on Owls and we will celebrate our very own class Owls Birthday! (Olive the Class Owl will be 2!)

We have lots of fun activities planned to celebrate.

Reception

The children in Reception have been working their socks off this week. They have produced some amazing writing. Some children have even been writing SENTENCES on their own!

We are so very proud of you all and how hard you are working.

In Literacy, we have been retelling our "Room on the Broom" story using a story map and actions. Our favourite part is when the witch says "DOWN!" In maths we have been thinking about what makes up the quantities of 4 and 5.

We are in full nativity mode as well, the children are doing so well learning their lines, songs and dance moves. It's definitely going to be a good show. Parts were sent home and the clothes you need to provide for their costumes. If you are unsure, please just ask.

Thank you again to the parents who supported our VIP sessions this week. The children love welcoming you into class and it's great that you get to see their amazing work.

Year 1

Year One started the week with a lovely religious retreat with Mrs Famer. The children explored what God's love is and what it means to them. They then painted a picture to represent this. In English this week, we sequenced the story of supertato using pictures and captions. We then generated adjectives to describe Supertato, before putting these into punctuated sentences. In Maths, we learnt about how to subtract by crossing out and how to subtract using a number line. In Geography, we continued learning about the UK, focusing on capital cities. In our R.E lesson, we looked at the symbolism of the baptism candle and how it represents the light of Christ in our lives. We finished the week with a lovely Mass with Year Two.

Year 2

How talented our Year 2 children are! We have been working hard preparing for our class assembly and we loved performing it to you yesterday afternoon! The children really enjoyed learning about the Great Fire of London, and this was reflected in the children's enthusiasm when practising for our assembly.

Well done to all children!

In English, we have been building our knowledge of subordinating conjunctions and writing them in speech bubbles to describe characters' thoughts. We have also created a story map re-telling The Disgusting Sandwich in preparation to write a diary entry from the perspective of the badger. In Maths, we have been adding 2 digit numbers crossing a tens' boundary, using manipulatives to help us. In R.E, we have started our Advent unit and we have labelled the parts of an Advent Wreath. We ended our week with a beautiful Mass and the children were extremely respectful as always!

Year 3

We have had another busy week in Year 3. On Wednesday, we were honoured to be asked to sing a special hymn, commissioned by the Bishop of Salford Diocese, as part of the 2025 Pilgrims of Hope Jubilee. We went to church and were recorded singing our hymn on the altar. The children sang beautifully and all the teachers were proud of their excellent behaviour.

In RE, we finished our unit of work on Promises by looking at some of the important items used at a Baptism (such as a white garment, a candle and the Oil of Chrism) and finding out about their meaning. We thought about the ways in which we can 'let our light shine brightly', and the children came up with some lovely ideas about how they can bring their own light to dark places, by being kind to others or helping out at home.

In English, we have now completed our book 'Into the Forest' and we have written a recount of the events of the story from the boy's point of view. We tried hard to use dialogue in our recounts, using inverted commas.

In Maths, we are continuing to work hard on subtraction, and this week we have been subtracting three digit numbers, crossing both the tens and hundreds boundary. It has been tricky work but we are now getting the hang of it!

Year 4

It's been another productive week in Year Four.

In English, we are still working on our book, 'Change Sings', and have answered different questions in response to the story and discussed what change means to us. The children have had some very reflective and thoughtful answers to this which has been lovely to see. Next week, the children are going to start planning their own poem about change before upgrading it and publishing it.

In Maths, we have finished off our unit of Area and are making our way through Multiplication and Division; using our knowledge of times tables to support our learning. The children have found recalling their knowledge on 3s, 6s and 9s a little tricky at times so please can you keep encouraging the children to practise their times tables at home

We are preparing to start our new unit on Rivers in Geography and will be studying the water cycle and how water travels through it.

In RE, our new unit is about Belonging and being called and we have been reading the story of Samuel and how he was called by God to do many great things in his life.

Year 5

We have had a wonderful week in Year 5.

This week in English, we have continued to study Room 13. The children have looked carefully at the use of subordinating conjunctions and relative pronouns to help create complex sentences. They have then used this information to write a short character description of Mrs Evans.

In Maths, we have now concluded our unit of work based on addition and subtraction. The children have been comparing calculations and balancing calculations by finding missing digits. We are very proud of the children's resilience and hard work.

In Geography we have started our in depth study of Brazil. We have located Brazil on a map, considered the bordering countries and the regions within Brazil itself. We have also looked at the landscape of Brazil closely.

How would you describe Mrs Evans and why?

Year 6

We have had a very productive week again in Year 6. The children have been busy working their way through a Mock SATs week, demonstrating all the progress they have already made so far this year. We have been so proud of the way they have conducted and applied themselves throughout the week - well done Year 6!

In Maths, we have continued to look at Fractions this week. Our primary focus has been on adding and subtracting mixed numbers. This required the children to understand equivalence and be able to convert between improper fractions and mixed numbers.

Our English work has centred around Olive and Cliff settling into life in Budmouth Point. The children wrote honest postcards from Olive's perspective, ensuring that their handwriting was immaculate. We have also started our new R.E. topic - Vocations and Commitment. This began by looking at the jobs Jesus had and moved on to looking at the roles priests play in our community. This gave us a better understanding of their roles and responsibilities, as well as an appreciation of the training and dedication required for the role.
