

Enjoy reading this Sunday's Gospel

When the crowds asked John the Baptist, "What must we do?" He answered, "If anyone has two coats they should share with the one who has none, and anyone who has food should do the same." There were tax collectors too who came for baptism, and they said

to him, "Master, what must we do?" He said to them, "Don't collect any more than you should." Then he said to some soldiers, "Don't force people to pay money to make you leave them alone, but be satisfied with your pay." By now, a feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John the Baptist might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, "I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not good enough even to until his sandal strap."



From the Gospel of Sunday 15th December 2024 Luke 3: 10-18 (the 3rd Sunday of Advent, Year C)

Which words stood out for you in this Gospel, and why? What does the picture make you think about? Now enjoy exploring this Wednesday's word, which is MERCY.

Wednesday's Word



"Read the gospels! This way we will learn what is most essential in our lives: love and mercy." Pope Francis

Who did the people think that John the Baptist might be? In this Sunday's Gospel, John the Baptist prepares the people for the coming of Jesus. He tells them to share with others and to show mercy - to put people (not money or power) first; to feel for those who suffer and to do something to help. Within the Catholic Church, these actions, attending to people's basic needs, are known as Corporal (or physical) Works of Mercy. Ask your child what the word 'mercy' means to them. You may want to share with your child what the word 'mercy' means to you. Can you or your child remember a time when you were merciful and gave someone another chance?

"God is merciful towards us. We too should learn to be merciful." Pope Francis

The Church also encourages us to perform Spiritual Works of Mercy. These include: being compassionate; being patient with others even if we are being treated unfairly; forgiving others (even if we feel they don't deserve forgiveness); sometimes giving people more than they deserve. Merciful people do things out of their love and care for others and this helps make the world a better place. Who do you know to be a merciful person? Each time we show 'mercy', we open ourselves to receive mercy from God. Each of you say if there is someone to whom you could show mercy this Advent.

Dear Lord Jesus, please help us to grow in the virtue of mercy - to be open to receiving your mercy and showing mercy to others. Amen.

Reception

We have been retelling our story "Jesus' Christmas Party" using our Talk for Writing skills and in maths we have been embedding our knowledge on shapes - are they squares or not squares? We have also been busy making some very special Christmas surprises for our families at home.

We really cannot believe that next week will be our final week of our first term. We have had the best time and are looking forward to our party day and whole school mass.

Year 1

What a busy week we have had! Firstly we would like to thank you for coming to our Christmas Carol Service and congratulate the children on doing such a great job.

We have been enjoying our new text "Winter's Child". The children have written some wonderful setting descriptions.

We have also been busy exploring materials to see if they could freeze and melt, sink or float or whether they would absorb liquid or not. We had great fun predicting and testing our ideas. In geography we created maps based on our walk last week.

We have been keeping our calculation skills and phonic skills sharp with daily activities. In RE we continue to learn about symbols of Advent and wrote about the Annunciation.

Task: Challenge yourself on "Hit The Button" number bonds questions.

Year 2

Another very busy week in Year 2!

In English this week, we have been writing using contractions and a range of exciting vocabulary to write letters in the role of Father Christmas. We wrote thank you notes to Little Robin from our book 'Little Robin Red Vest', to thank him for his kindness.

In Maths, the children have worked so hard and have been subtracting two digit numbers that cross ten using place value charts. They have really impressed us! In RE, we learnt about the Visitation, and thought carefully about the feelings of Mary and Elizabeth.

In Geography, we have explored the features and climates of the different continents and created visual maps of these.

Towards the end of the week, the children blew us away with their singing and acting in all of their Nativity performances - we are so proud of each and every one of you! We ended the week with a peaceful and thoughtful Celebration of the Word.

Question: What can you exchange 'ten' for?

Year 3

This week in Year 3 was a busy as ever! The Children in Mrs Artingstall's Rainbow group performed the play 'The Lion and the Mouse' for some of the staff. Their reading was so confident and fluent.

We have begun to practise for our Advent Carol Service which will be taking place next week. The children are trying hard to learn the carols.

In English, we have worked on paragraphing so that the children are able to structure their texts more successfully. Today they planned out a narrative based on the book 'The Dark.' The story will be a spin off of the original book and will be written from The Dark's point of view.

In Maths, we have looked at arrays as well as the difference between grouping and sharing. They children have been working hard on their 4 times table.

In RE, we have continued to think about how we can prepare for Christmas by doing kind deeds and refraining from being thoughtless towards others.

In Geography this week, we compared the populations of the four countries of the UK. The children used maps to identify the most highly populated areas and to consider why some areas are sparsely populated.

Question: Which city is the most populated in the UK?

Year 4

This week in Year Four, we have been busy finishing off units of work and getting in the Christmas Spirit.

On Wednesday, we were treated to a Christmas performance from Year Two who did so well remembering all of the their lines and putting on a great show. We all really enjoyed it! We have also been practising the carols for our Carol Service in church next week. On Thursday and Friday, we began making calendars to take home. The children loved using a combination of different skills and media to create a piece of art they could be proud of!

In English, we finished reading A Christmas Carol and wrote a letter of apology in character as Scrooge. The children worked to incorporate all of the writing techniques that they have been developing throughout this unit. It was a real pleasure to read their writing and see how much they have engaged in the story and its characters.

In RE, we learnt about the life of a Christian Missionary named Sean Devereux. The children were inspired by his bravery, his sacrifices and love he showed to those in need.

Question: Who was Scrooge visited by in A Christmas Carol?

Year 5

As we approach Christmas, Year 5 are working hard to complete units of work in Maths, English, RE, Science and Geography, whilst also preparing for the celebration of the birth of our Lord.

In English, this week, we have planned and begun to write Chapter 13 of our book 'Room 13'. This is an opportunity for the children to use their imaginations, as this chapter is missing from the book. We have been amazed by their creativity and ability to create suspense and tension in their work. We can not wait to share some of the children's work with you.

Prime, Composite, Square and Cube numbers have been the focus in our Maths lessons this week. The children have investigated the properties of these numbers, considering the number of factors, as well as identifying patterns and relationships. The children are becoming increasingly confident with using these mathematical terms and are able to make generalisations.

In RE, the children explored the sacrament of Marriage. They produced a marriage booklet, selecting relevant scripture, hymns and identifying the different elements of the marriage ceremony. As part of our work during Advent, the children also considered the symbolism of the candles on the Advent wreath and analysed the lyrics of the hymn 'The Servant King' in relation to Jesus' service to others.

Question: Can you write a definition for Prime and Composite numbers?

Year 6

This week, the children have worked extremely hard as we begin to come to an end of our units of work this half term. We are very proud of their continuing efforts, well done Year 6!

In English this week, the children have unpicked more about characters in the story as secrets have been revealed! As a stray suitcase washed up on the shore, the children have been working hard to analyse features of a newspaper report as well as consolidating their knowledge of direct and reported speech before writing a newspaper report of their own next week, detailing the events.

In Maths, the children have been focusing on and developing their understanding of coordinates. The children initially began by looking at the first quadrant before extending this to the four quadrants. Towards the end of the week, we began problem solving using coordinates which the children initially found quite tricky but have demonstrated great perseverance and resilience with this. Next week, we will begin to look at translations and reflections.

Question: What is the orientation of a newspaper?
