

THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 19th January 2025



There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there with Jesus and his disciples. When they ran out of wine, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." Jesus

said, "Woman why turn to me? My hour has not come yet." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." There were six stone water jars standing there; each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water," and they filled them to the brim. "Draw some out now," he told them, "and take it to the steward." They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into the best wine. This was the first of the signs given by Jesus: it was given at Cana in Galilee. He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him.



Nursery

In Nursery this week we have been reading the story Naughty Bus. We have been responding to the story through pictures and talking about our favourite part of the journey.

The children have used cereal boxes and lots of red paint to create their own Naughty Bus. The children have also been painting familiar transport as we continue our theme.

In maths we have been learning about numeral 3, composition of 3 and counting. We have been learning the song 3 little kittens.

In phonics we continue to learn lots of initial sounds, our rhyme of the week has been the Grand Old Duke of York.

Outside the children have been having fun with lots of role play using our new traffic signs.

Questions: Can you count three objects at home? Look out for the number 3 when you are out and about this weekend!

Reception

Another great week in Reception, the weeks are flying by. The children are thoroughly enjoying retelling our class text, "The Train Ride" using talk for writing. The children are really getting used to the core actions that are used in most stories as well as coming up with new actions that are special to specific stories. Well done, Reception!

In maths we have been thinking what 2 numbers add up to make 5. In RE, we started our new unit on celebrations in church. We thought about the different events we celebrate and how we prepare for them with our families.

Year 1

This week seems to have whizzed by! We have been very busy and productive in Y1. In English the children have been working hard to write sentences that include words that have suffixes. In handwriting we have been learning to form zig zag and smile family letters. Our place value work in maths means we now understand how many tens and ones make each number from 11 to 19. We have completed our seasonal changes work on Winter with a walk around the grounds and started our new topic of animals, by learning about mammals. In art we have studied the work of Emma Burleigh and Paul Klee to use watercolours to create our own paintings. In RE we continued to think about the presentation at the Temple. We looked at Luke's gospel and reflected on how we can be the light in someone's life.

TASK: Practice counting(forwards and backwards) and writing numbers to 20

Year 2

We have had another great week in Year 2 and the children are settling back into routine after the Christmas break.

In English this week, we have been starting to read our new book 'Lizzie and the birds'. We have been exploring adverbs and using these to write more detailed sentences about the story so far.

In Maths, we have been coming to the end of our shape unit and have been sorting 3D shapes based on their properties.

In RE, we have begun to understand the importance of the Holy Bible, and what the Gospel stories can teach us.

In Science, we have been thinking about what it means to be sustainable, and ways that we can reduce our plastic usage.

We have also started our new History topic all about the suffragettes, which the children are looking forward to learning more about.

Year 3

We had a jam packed week in Year 3!

Both classes went on a trip to Droylsden Library and enjoyed a session with one of the librarians who explained how the books are organised and how to find a book on a specific subject. Then the children browsed the books. Many of them now have library cards so they took a book home.

In English we have continued with our book 'The Tin Forest.' We worked on the use of prepositional phrases and each child created their own poem based on the world of the book.

In History we began our work on the Ancient Greeks. The children completed a timeline of important events. We then compared events taking place in Britain at a similar time.

In Religion, we have been looking in more detail at the Liturgical Calendar, identifying which religious celebration and holy days take place at which time of the year.

In Maths we are still working hard on our times tables so the children become as fluent as possible in their recall.

Year 4

Year Four have had a busy week!

We have been developing our sewing skills in Design and Technology in order to make a bag. The children have practised running and cross stitch and began to make their final product. We have been so impressed with the level of resilience and talent that we have in Year Four and can't wait to see them all finished.

In English, we started reading our new book, a novel called 'The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane'. We have had lots of really interesting discussions about the characters and explored the challenging vocabulary that we have come across so far.

In Science, we have been thinking about evaporation and the children thought of so many examples where evaporation takes place in everyday life without us even realising. We have set up an investigation to explore our theory that temperature speeds up the evaporation process.

In RE, we have been thinking about communities and the many communities that we are a part of. We then read Scripture from Mark's gospel in which Jesus selects His apostles, therefore creating a very special community. The children are working on some beautiful artwork to represent this Scripture.

Year 5

The children have worked incredibly hard this week in year 5.

Today, we held a Design Technology day in school, where the children sampled a range of vegetarian food, investigated Babette Davis (a vegetarian chef), conducted independent research on food preferences around school and designed a vegetarian eat well plate. Next week, we will be planning and making a vegetarian meal before evaluating our work.

Sentence structure has been a focus in English this week. The children created single-clause sentences before adding coordinating conjunctions to create compound sentences. Following this, the children wrote a setting description based on a documentary about Madagascar, in which they incorporated prepositional phrases.

This week, we have completed our units of work in Science and Geography. The children wrote explanations in Science to describe day and night in relation to the rotation and orbit of the Earth around the Sun. Finally they explored the movement of the Moon in relation to Earth and the different phases of the Moon. In Geography, the children researched Brazilian culture and identified the inequalities faced by those living in the Favelas.

Year 6

Our week has been dominated by TTRS! Both classes worked extremely hard; the competition went all the way to the wire. Fittingly, the result at 08:55 was a draw - almost certainly the first in St. Stephen's history. We want to thank all of the children for their efforts as this was the highest scoring Battle of the Bands we have ever had!

Away from TTRS, we have spent the week looking into Baba Yaga, who is a character from Slavic folklore who features in The House with Chicken Legs. The children have conducted some research of their own, structured their findings and produced some excellent information pages.

In Maths, the children have continued to impress throughout our unit on Ratios. This started with looking at the symbol involved, investigating the relationship between ratios and fractions, and finished by looking at scale drawings and similar shapes.

In Science, we have also started our Electricity unit. Our first task was to identify and use the symbols used to represent elements in a circuit. As we move on with the unit, the children will have the opportunity to make their own circuits and explore the impact changes can make.
