Enjoy reading this Sunday's Gospel


When Jesus and his disciples came down from the mountain, a great crowd came from all over to hear him teach and to be cured. Jesus fixed his eyes

Blessed are you who are sad now, because later you will laugh. Blessed are you if people hate you and ignore you, and insult and attack you just because you follow me. Be glad and rejoice, because your reward will be great in heaven."

Wednesday's Word



"Put your trust in God! The Beatitudes are Jesus' way of life." Pope Francis

What did Jesus say belongs to the poor? The blessings in this Sunday's Gospel, which are taken from Jesus' Sermon on the Plain (or Mount), are Luke's version of the 'Beatitudes'. This is one of the most well-known passages in the Bible and has encouraged people throughout the ages to trust in God. The Beatitudes remind us that, however bad things might look, those who serve and trust in God will have the reward of his everlasting love and blessings. It takes complete trust in God for us to live in this way. Ask your child what the word 'trust' means to them. Knowing who to trust is really important. Which people does your child really trust and why do they trust them?

"Trust the past to God's mercy, the present to God's love and the future to God's care." St Augustine of Hippo

Trusting in God's promises isn't always easy - but it's always rewarding. No amount of worrying will increase our safety or comfort; it's through trusting in God that we will find security and hope. Each of you say how, in the days ahead, you can show your trust in God. Perhaps you can: pray and offer any concerns to God if you are feeling worried; try to do your best without being afraid of making occasional mistakes; believe that God will bring good out of all that happens in life, even when things seem to be going wrong.

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


Jesus wants us to trust in God. There can be many things that trouble our hearts, but following and trusting in God frees us from worrying in this life and assures us of life forever with God.

Nursery

What a wonderful last week of term we have had in Nursery.

We have worked so hard this week practicing for our class assembly, especially learning the words and actions to our favourite songs- Magic Penny and My Lighthouse. We hope you enjoyed it as much as we did!

We have enjoyed exploring the classroom this week, being creative and working in the Maths Area. We have continued to focus on the number 5 and the children are working hard to recognise and subitise numbers.

In RE, we enjoyed listening to the story Lost and Found- which focused on Friendship, the children were sympathetic to the Penguin in the story and were able to retell the story in detail by understanding the characters feelings.

Next term our topic focus will be Growing and Planting- we are very excited to learn all about our new class story- Jaspers Beanstalk. We hope to explore more of the school forest and allotment area next term now that the weather is improving. Have a fantastic half term- thank you for your continued support.

Reception

This week has been jam packed! We are really loving our class text "Handa's Surprise" and can now retell the story using Talk for Writing actions and a story map. In maths, we have continued to think about the numbers 6, 7 and 8. We have thought about 1 more and 1 less as well as the composition of the three numbers. In RE, we continued to look at the story "The Selfish Crocodile" and following on from that, we made a friendship soup with all the qualities that we look for in a good friend. Towards the end of the week we attended mass with our Year 6 special friends.

Year 1

We have had a very busy end to the half term. The children have made us very proud with their latest round of phonics assessments, it is clear hard work at school and at home is paying off. Thank you for your continued support. In maths we continue to develop our addition skills and have spent a lot of time working on number bonds within 10 to help with our fluency. We completed our science unit on animals by learning about herbivores and omnivores. Our latest science assessments show the children have retained lots of information on this topic.

As a final activity in our RE work we revisited all the stories from Luke's Gospels telling us about Jesus' early life. In history we designed our own planes and then to finished our week with a great visit to the Aviation Centre.

Year 2

What a lovely week we have had in Year 2!

This week, the children have been working hard with their introduction to repeated addition and multiplication sentences.

In English, they have been planning, writing and editing their own report all about a bird of their choice. At the end of the week, we published these beautifully.

In RE, we have been continuing to explore 'thanksgiving', and we have been understanding the events of a Mass.

In History, we continue to ask questions about the Suffragettes, and have been using historical sources to learn more about Emmeline Pankhurst. In Art, we used secondary and primary colours to explore expressive painting styles. We ended the week with a peaceful celebration of the word, and some lovely Valentines crafts.

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Year 4

As we come to the end of another term, it is wonderful to recognise how much the children have achieved and how hard they have worked.

Over the past few weeks, we have been researching and writing about the RMS Queen Mary as a link to the novel we are reading in English. The children have shown such interest and enthusiasm for topic and so it was a pleasure to finally be able to read the non chronological reports that they have put together as a result.

In Science, we have been learning about the human ear and how it works. We drew scientific diagrams and answered questions about how we hear things and how we can protect our hearing.

In History this week, we learned about the Viking attack on the island of Lindisfarne. It gave us more of an insight into who the Vikings were and taught us that they weren't just barbarians, but an organised, forward thinking army.

Year 5

What a great final week of the half term we have had this week! In English, we have been delving into the captivating world of "Brightstorm." The children have been actively engaged in expanding their vocabulary, which they have creatively applied in their own airship descriptions.

In Maths, our focus has been on adding mixed number fractions. The children have demonstrated great perseverance while working through the various steps, especially when faced with different denominators.

In History, we have been examining the Tudor period and its position on a timeline. Through this exploration, we have taken a closer look at significant events that defined this era.

It has been Children's Mental Health Week, a timely opportunity for us to reflect on mental well-being. The children participated in activities aimed at promoting self-care and awareness. Additionally, they took part in an online session focusing on staying safe in the digital world, particularly regarding online scams.

Finally, on Thursday, we celebrated 'Dress to Express' day. The children looked fantastic in their individual outfits, showcasing their unique personalities.

We hope you all have a wonderful half term holiday.

Year 6

We've been finishing the half term in style in Year 6 this week.

In Maths, we have been tackling Algebra - which always sounds difficult but the children have made light work of it. This involved looking at function machines, creating expressions and then substituting values into expressions to form equations. In English, we continued to read The House With Chicken Legs and discovered that Marinka has been treating the house extremely poorly. We had a recap on fronted adverbials and then had a go at writing the next section of the story, incorporating fronted adverbials to improve the effectiveness of our writing.

For our R.E. work, we have been focusing on scripture from Corinthians. We analysed the text, extracted the key messages from the text and then thought about famous people who would benefit from following the messages. We discussed how the world would be a much better place if we all followed the words in our everyday lives.

We continued our unit on renewable and non-renewable energy sources in Geography and explored the advantages and disadvantages of using clean energy sources.
