

Wednesday Good News for Families T@GETHER TIME

Enjoy reading this Sunday's Gospel


Jesus told a parable to his disciples. "Why do you observe the splinter in your friend's eye and never notice the plank in your own eye? How can you say to your friend,

'Friend, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye,' when you cannot see the plank in your own eye? You hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your friend's eye. A good tree cannot produce bad fruit, and a bad tree cannot produce good fruit. You can tell what a tree is like by the fruit it produces. You cannot pick figs or grapes from brambles. A good person does good things out of the good stored up in their heart; a bad person does bad things out of the badness in their heart. Your words show what is in your heart.



From the Gospel of Sunday 2nd March 2025 Cf. Luke 6:39-45 (the 8th Sunday in Ord Time, Year C)

Which words stood out for you in this Gospel, and why? What does the picture make joy exploring this Wednesday's word, which is ACTION.



Wednesday's Word ACTION &



"We must live the faith, not only with our words, but with our actions." Pope Francis

What did Jesus say 'a good person' does? In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus is using parables short stories - to teach us important lessons. Just as good fruit is a sign of a good tree, so our words and actions show what is truly inside our heart. Ask your child what the saying, 'Actions speak louder than words' means to them. Tell your child about a time when someone was a really good friend or neighbour to you because of something they did. Then ask your child if they can remember a time when someone was really good to them.

"Actions speak louder than words; let your words teach and your actions speak." St Anthony of Padua

This Gospel also reminds us not to criticise others' actions but rather to look at our own actions and try to grow in goodness. Decide on some kind of action that you could take to show your love for God and others. Perhaps you can: visit a person who may need your help; try to be humble and truthful about any of your own faults; say sorry to one another for anything you have done wrong; help around the home more; offer to help out with a voluntary project; resist being quick to criticise; always try to look for the good in others; remember to be understanding, compassionate, caring and speak kindly of others.

Dear Lord Jesus, please help us to be good friends to our family, our neighbours and all who we meet through our words and actions. Amen.



Nursery

Welcome back to Spring Term 2! We have had a lovely week back in Nursery and we certainly have enjoyed spending time outdoors this week.

In Literacy we have started our new book 'Jasper's Beanstalk' we have loved listening to Jasper's gardening adventures when he planted his bean in the soil. We have enjoyed lots of activities based around our new topic of growing- we have been retelling the story through mark marking, matching beans to numbers and painting our very own 'tall' beanstalks.

In Maths we have used numicon to make the number 5, we have used different numicon pieces and we can show different ways of making 5 using our fingers. We enjoyed our afternoon at the school allotment with Mrs Artingstall on Wednesday- seeing our very own beanstalks! We also helped Mrs Artingstall to look after the school chickens! We counted the eggs that they had laid!

A HUGE 20 altogether! WOW!

Question-What should we give to our beanstalks to help them grow?

Reception

Welcome back, Reception! It has been lovely to see you all after the half term break and you have all certainly hit the ground running! Well done! We have started our new topic based around growing. We have been busy at the planting station in our outdoor area, making sure we have all the things that make plants and flowers grow.

In literacy, we have been reading our new class text which is titled "Bloom."
We have loved this story and are looking forward to retelling it next week
using our Talk for Writing skills.

In maths, we have been learning about pairs and doubling - can you remember what we add to a number to double it?

In RE we began our unit on Lent and Easter. As we are entering the period of Lent, we have been thinking about how we prepare for Easter.

Year 1

It has been lovely to welcome the children back this week and we have had a very exciting start to term. In English, our new book 'How to look after your dinosaur' was delivered alongside a mysterious box with an egg inside. The children made predictions about what might be inside the egg and who could have sent it. We then discussed the different feelings in experienced in the book using emojis and created a story map.

In maths this week, we subtracted numbers within 20 using a number line and found the difference between quantities. We then explored related addition and subtraction facts using 'fact families'. Our new fluency bee booklet is all about 10.

In Science, we started our sustainability unit and discussed how we can help care for our planet. In Geography we begin our topic on 'Wonderful Weather' and started recording the current weather.

Question: What harms our planet?

Year 2

We have had a great first week back after the half term! In English, we have started our new book, 'Mr Bunny's Chocolate Factory'. We have described the characters emotions using emojis and created a wanted poster for one of the missing chickens! In preparation for writing a letter of resignation from the perspective of one of the chickens, we have analysed an example of one and practised writing in the present tense.

In Maths, we have been doing some fantastic work with multiplication and division! We have been practising different methods of division by sharing and grouping.

In R.E, we have thought about ways that we can give thanks and we described the special 'Holy, holy' prayer.

We have now finished our History unit about the Suffragettes and the children were able to share lots of ways about how their work has had a positive impact on women's lives today. To end the week, 2AL had a fantastic trip to Droylsden Library. We had a lovely calm afternoon writing our pledges for Pilgrims of Hope 2025.

Question: What is 8 shared between 2? How many groups of 2 make 8?

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Year 4

Welcome back, we hope you all had an enjoyable half-term break. The children have done well to settle back into their routines and have impressed us with their attitude to their learning.

In English, we concluded our non-chronological reports on The RMS Queen Mary and have completed some reading activities based on the next chapters of our text about Edward Tulane and his miraculous journey.

The children really enjoyed investigating the text for clues and pairing up Edward's feelings with a corresponding emoji!

In Maths, we are finishing our unit on multiplication and division and are moving onto length and perimeter of rectilinear shapes. The children must remember to count carefully when calculating the perimeter of a shape! Please can we also ask that you encourage your child to continue practising their times tables on Times

Tables Rockstars at home - thank you.

In RE, we are heading to the end of our community topic and in Science, we have been investigating how sound travels. The children have also enjoyed their music sessions with Miss Bradley and Tameside Music Service.

Question: can you remember one similarity and one difference between Viking and Anglo-Saxon life?

Year 5

What a wonderful first week back! The children returned to school refreshed, enthusiastic, and ready to embrace new challenges. This week was particularly special as our pupils enjoyed an amazing trip to Jodrell Bank, where they explored the wonders of space and science. Throughout the day, they impressed us with their excellent behaviour and inquisitive minds, asking insightful questions that showed just how engaged they are with their learning

This week in Maths, the children have been developing their use of formal methods of long multiplication. Using models and images to support their learning, they have explored the connection between repeated addition and multiplication. They understand the commutative nature of multiplication and addition calculations, which will be fundamental as they progress through the unit of work.

In Science, the children used electrical circuits to investigate the conductivity of various materials, discovering which ones are conductors of electricity and which are not. They also planned an experiment to investigate the effectiveness of a range of insulators, which they will conduct next week.

Finally, in RE, the children explored various Christian denominations, comparing beliefs and traditions with those of the Catholic Church. The children also took a virtual tour of St James' C of E Church in London and were surprised by the number of similarities to our own church of St Stephen's.

Question: Which materials make the most effective conductors?

Year 6

A very exciting week here in Year 6! This week, children in both classes enjoyed completing their level 1 and 2 Bikeability training with Active Tameside. All of the children had an amazing time and demonstrated great perseverance and maturity as they listened, understood and practiced road safety.

In Maths, we have revisited our topic of Algebra and developed our understanding of formulae. We also focused on equations, including the solving of single step problems. Next week, we will move on to utilise our understanding and applying this to multi-step problems.

Throughout our English lessons, we have focused on understanding and applying the active and passive voice in our writing before applying this to sentences of our own based on our text of 'The House with Chicken Legs'. We have immersed ourselves in the text, reading the next four chapters and analysing the House's emotions in preparation for our independent writing next week.

In preparation for our double page spread in Geography, we have conducted some in depth research about deforestation and the production of timber, analysing the impact and devastating effects on the planet, wildlife, people and ecosystems.

Question: How else can y + y + y' be represented?

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
